Even the local vicar Tim Wilson made an appearance and retired early with the Evensong excuse.

This was a match between Wilden and the Polhill Arms. Except after a breakfast, not continental as previously reported, but a beer-laden affair with the remains of the previous night's curry, they became known as Renhold Newcomers.

There was a meeting including the top-level management at the Polhill Arms where the new name was agreed. Apparently this was to ensure the Renhold public house was not

brought into disrepute during the afternoon.

The Newcomers arrived in style on a tractor to the tune of 'Eye of the Tiger' and to be fair against their supposedly more professional, well nearly semi, they performed pretty well in the field.

The ECB are apparently investigating the misuse of Duckworth-Lewis at Lord's with two bottles of gin.

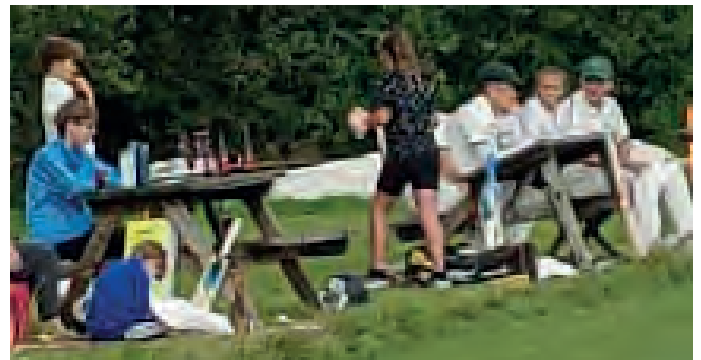

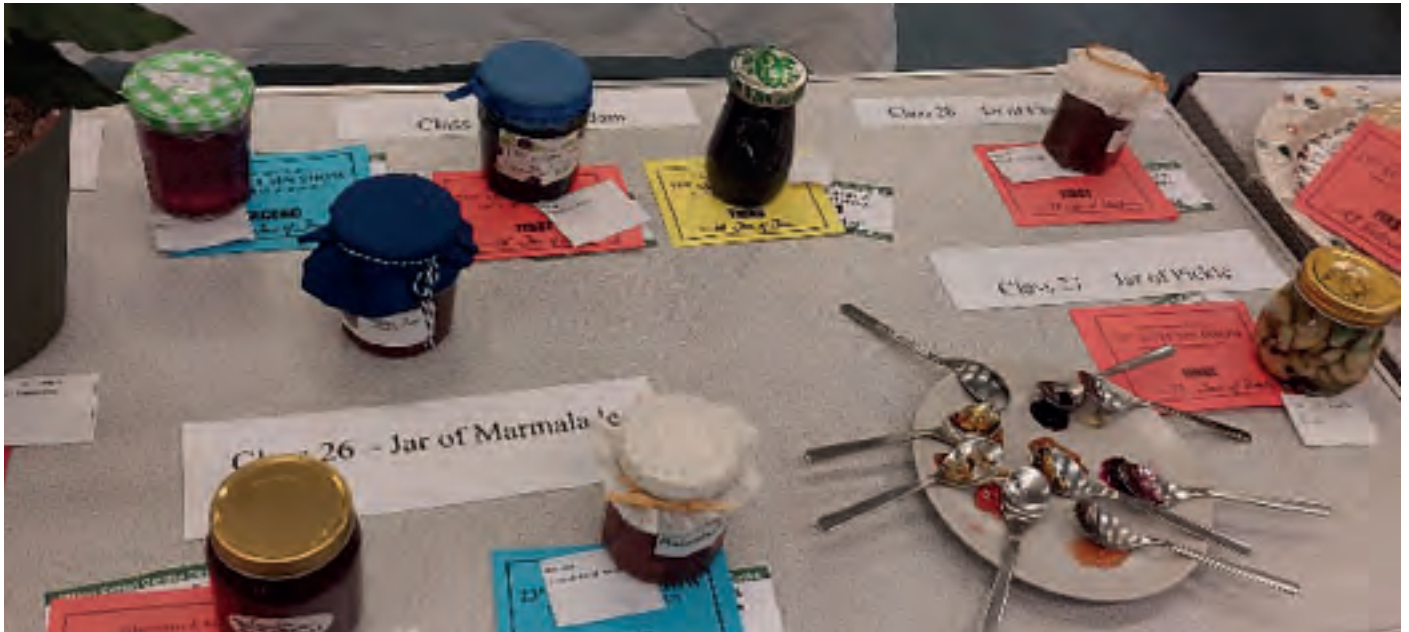
Although the number of entries are still below the levels of pre-Covid, there was a high standard of exhibits.

Hardy souls ventured out to the Giddy Goat Christmas Market in Riseley on a rainy 4th November day.

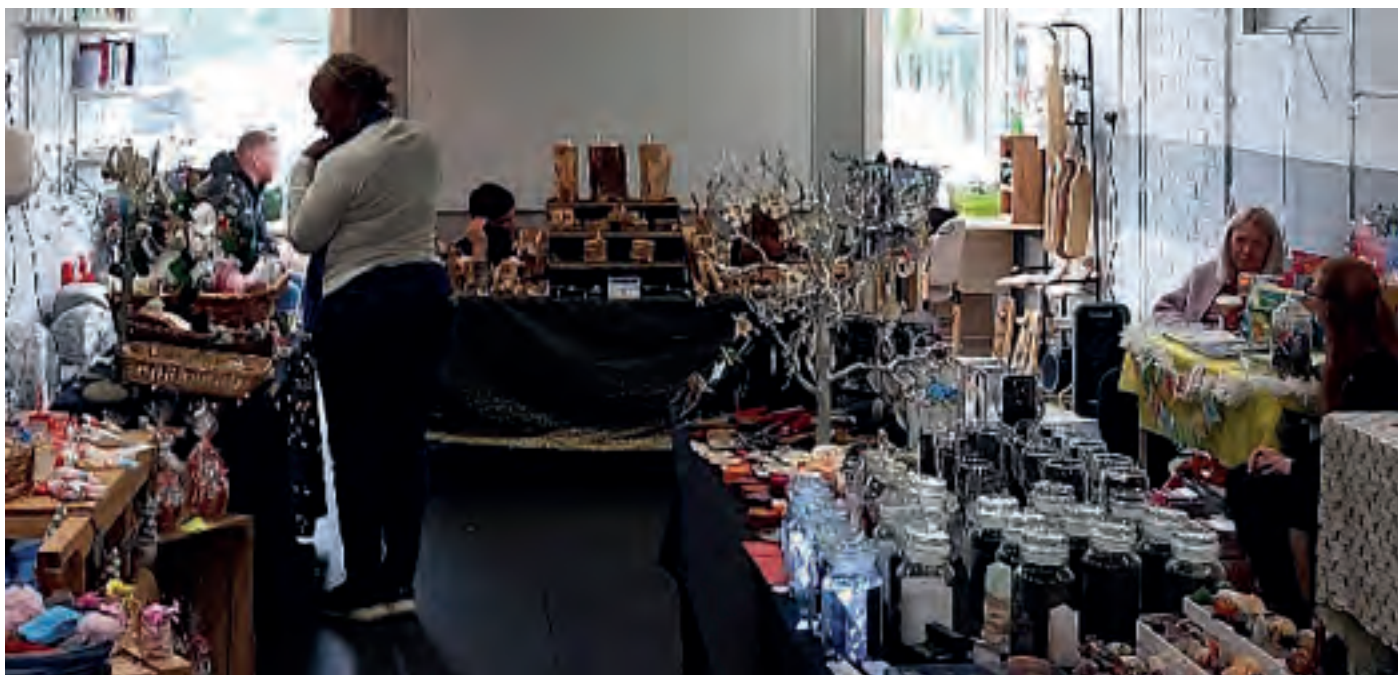

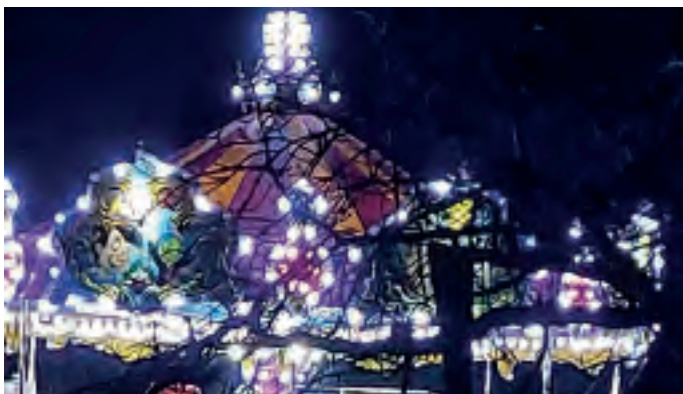

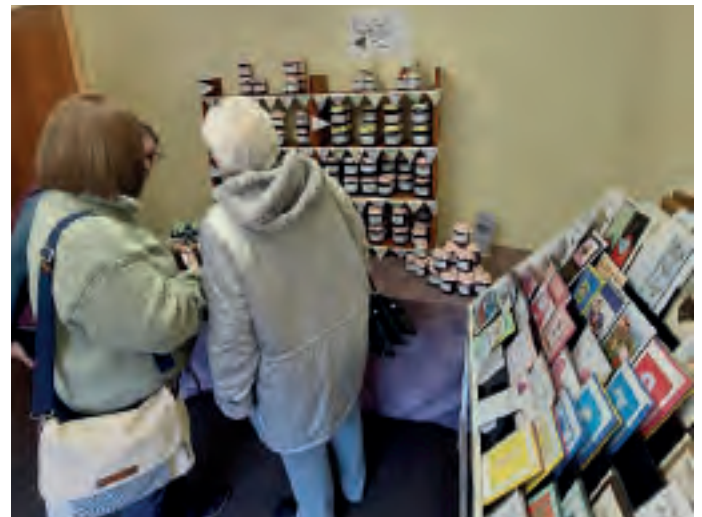

The talk of the sporting summer has been about England bowler James Anderson still playing Test cricket at age 41.

Without doubt, the 'Burnley Lara' is something of a legend but Riseley have their own legendary figure – Winston Jermy.

Although Winston lives in Kempston, few would argue that his loyalty lies with Riseley, especially with the cricket club.

Most people involved in cricket in the Bedford area will have heard of Winston Jermy. He has been a great servant to the sport and he is still playing at the age of 71.

For many years, he has been one of the first names to be penned in the Riseley team whether it is in the Bedford and District League, in years gone by, and now in the Bedfordshire Invitation League along with the Bedford Midweek League.

This is because he is a wily spinner that fools batsmen, regularly many years his junior.

However, Winston started out as a fast bowler and is well-remembered for his performances for Britannia Works in the Bedford Midweek League.

His greatest recognition is that he played in one of the opening games when the Midweek League was formed in 1968 and has played in every season since.

This has included appearances for Clapham and currently for Second Division side Riseley – a truly remarkable achievement.

"I have enjoyed every minute playing local cricket," said Winston. "I feel very proud that I have represented Riseley for 30 years.

"Equally, I am truly happy that I have played

every season in the Bedford Midweek League since it started in 1968.

"I have won a few awards in that competition such as team titles for Britannia Works in the early years. I also remember picking up the divisional bowling award.

"And there has been some success with Riseley over the decades. But for me it is being able to play the game and also encouraging others.

"I have seen a lot of youngsters join Riseley as 14-years-olds and they were smaller than me. And now they are in their 20s and 30s and six-foot-tall.

"I have also enjoyed playing against the West Indians, Indians and Pakistanis. It has been enjoyable getting to know them and ensuring they are part of the local cricketing community.

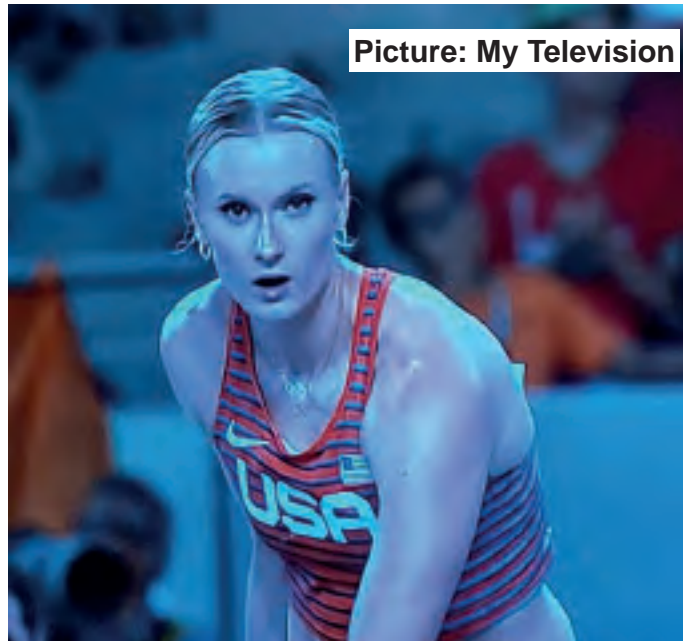
