Money raised from the event is going towards a favourite charity of Stephen's

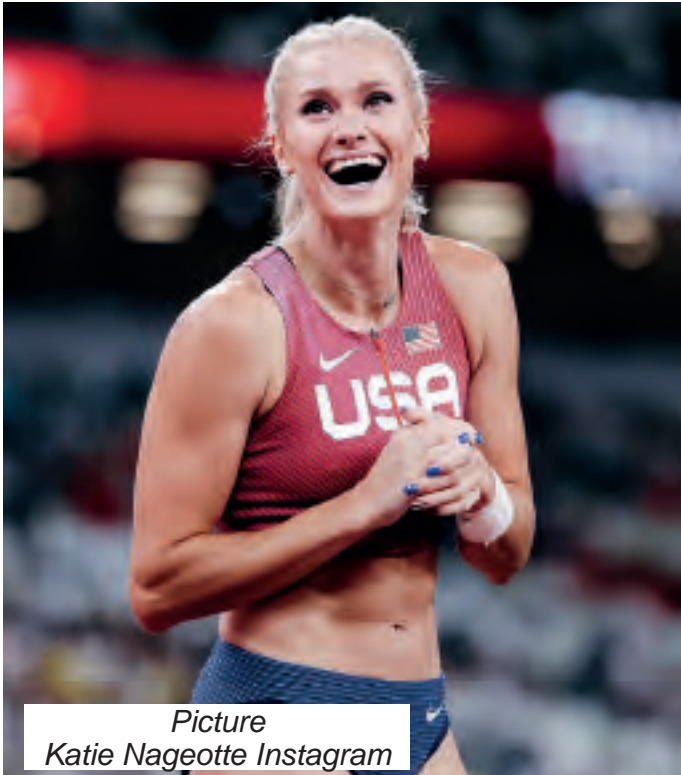
- St John's Hospice in Moggerhanger.

Olympic and World Champion Katie Moon competed in the recent Great Barford Run, which was organised in memory of her father-in-law Stephen Moon, who was a local borough councillor.

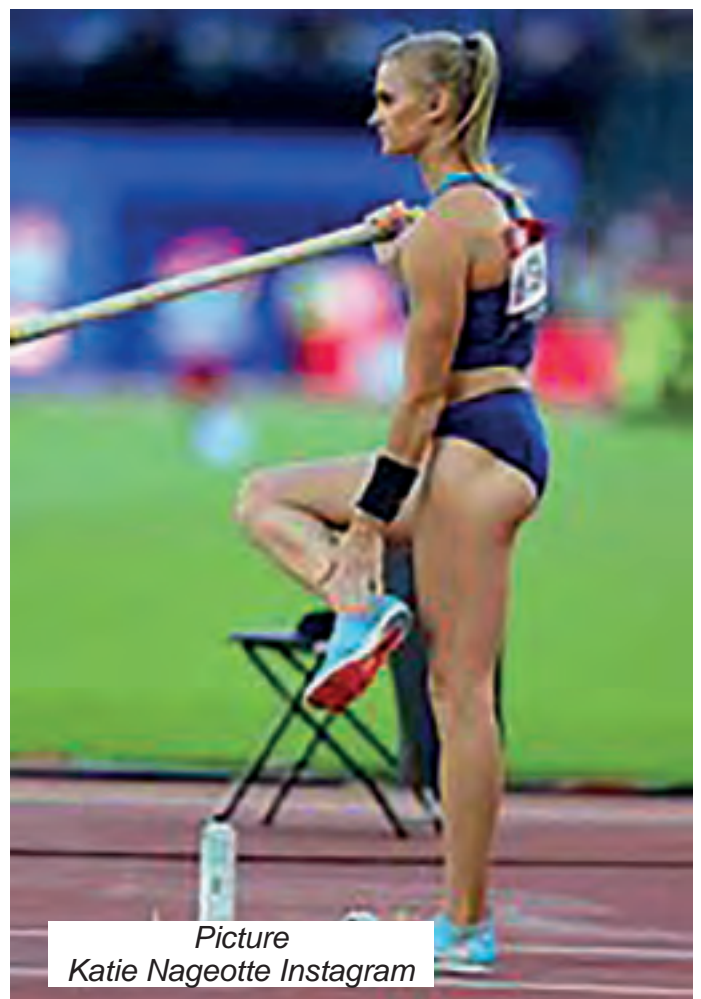
Better known in the athletics world as Katie Nageotte, she took gold for America in the 2020 Olympics, that took place in Tokyo in 2021, with a leap of 4.90 metres.

Katie followed this up with the World Championship title in 2022 in Eugene managing an impressive 4.85 metres.

This was an exciting contest as Katie's USA team-mate Sandi Morris also recorded 4.85 metres but had one failed attempt at the distance.

Last year, Katie took silver in the World Indoor Championships in Belgrade with 4.75 metres finishing behind her American rival Morris.

At the end of last year, Katie married Hugo Moon in a New Year's Eve celebration in Ohio to become, without doubt, Great Barford's most famous athlete.

BLETSOE SPRING CONCERT



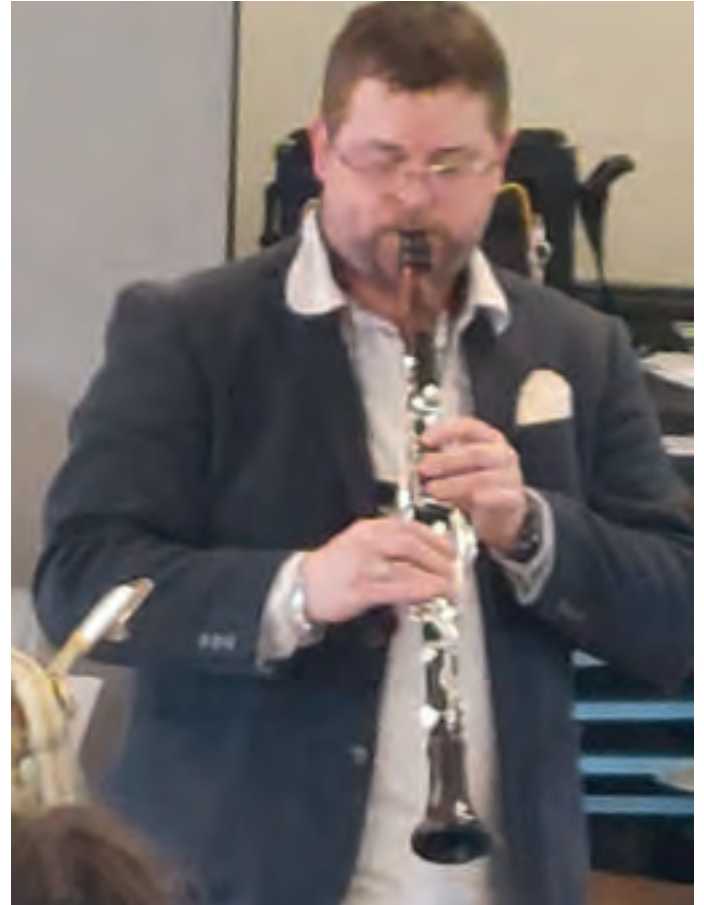

This included the flowering type along with the perennials.

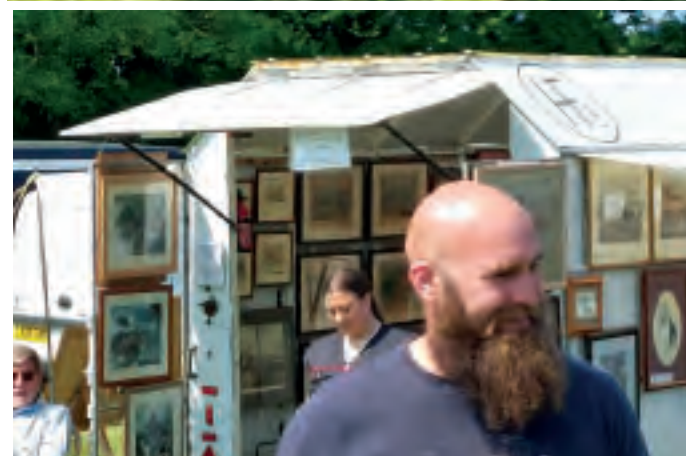
However, there was an excellent range of vegetable plants, including tomatoes and peppers along with several herbs.

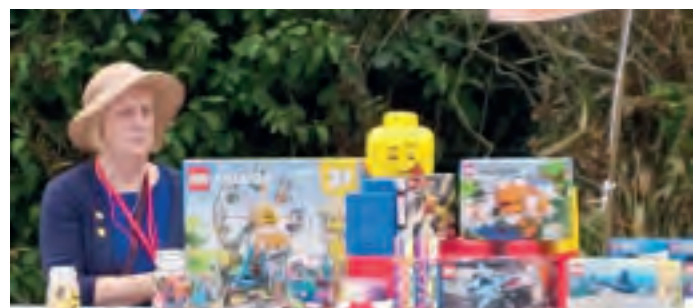
THE FAMOUS KEYSOE HOG ROAST

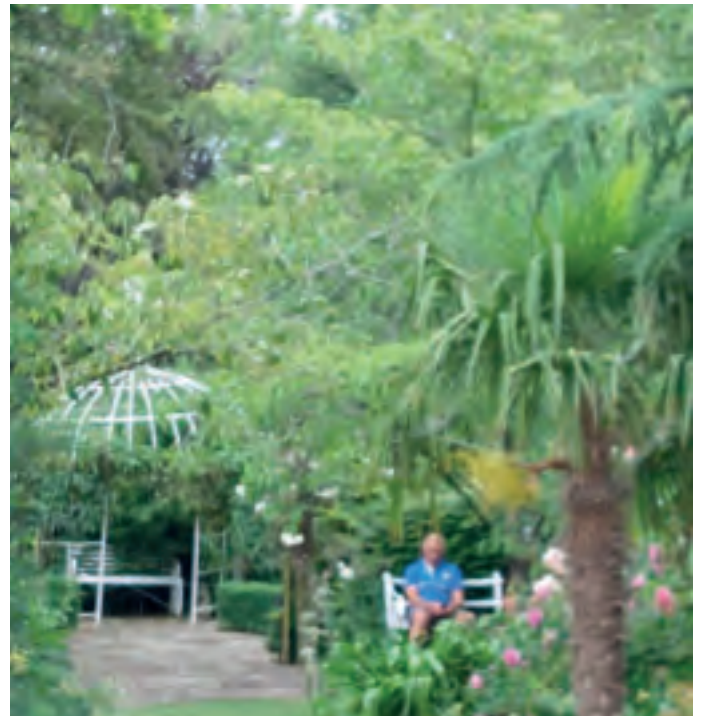

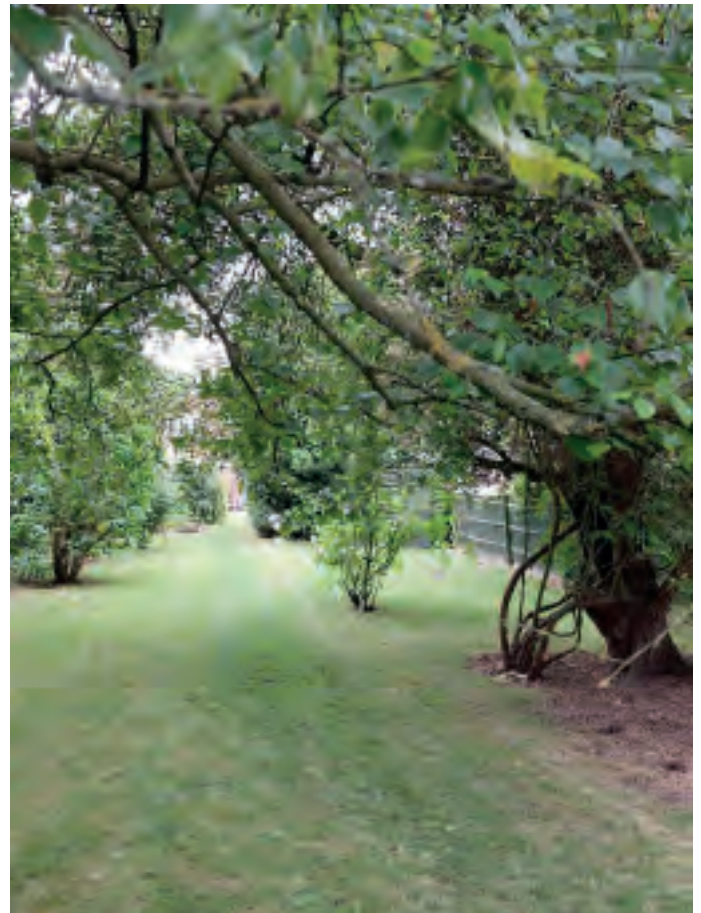

And for the creative, there was the opportunity to do some painting and pottery.

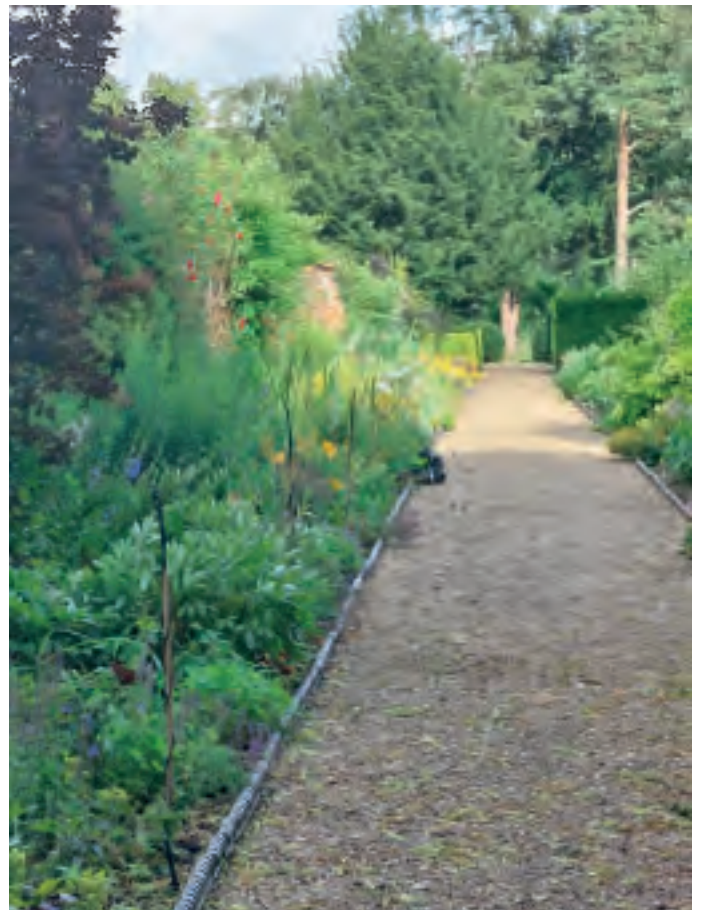
